Enjoying MILK, CHEESE and YOGURT is an easy way to get the essential nutrients needed in your family's diet. Speaking of hot weather, did you know July is ICE CREAM MONTH? Why not try this delicious dessert using ice cream? Submitted by Katherine Orczeck, 2013-2014 Blair County Dairy Princess.

Mom's Ice Cream Dessert

20oz pkg chocolate sandwich cookies
½ c. butter, melted
1½ c. chopped Spanish peanuts
½ gallon vanilla ice cream, softened
2 c. confectioner's sugar
12 fluid oz can evaporated milk
2/3 c. semisweet chocolate chips
½ c. butter

1 tsp vanilla extract

Crush all but 10 of the cookies. Combine crushed cookies in a large bowl with melted butter and peanuts. Press mixture into a 9X13 inch baking dish and freeze until cold. Spread softened ice cream over cold crust and freeze until set. Combine confectioner's sugar, evaporated milk, chocolate chips, ½ cup butter and vanilla in large saucepan and bring to a boil over medium heat. Boil 7 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and cool completely; pour over ice cream and freeze until set. Note: if you do not want to make your own chocolate sauce you can by a jar of prepared sauce.

Is the Heat affecting your Cows?

Summer has arrived which means the temperature is only going to rise! For some of us we may enjoy the hot, sunny weather but for our bovine friends this weather causes a lot of stress. Cows rely on water evaporation via sweating and panting to dissipate excess heat generated by their metabolism or the environment. Optimal body temperature is not maintained, while sustaining sufficient rumen efficiency and dry matter intake is not met.

Providing shade, ensuring adequate water supply, installing fans and water sprayers, and supplying more feed in the evening than the morning are all effective management strategies. Nutritionists can help by increasing the nutrient density of the diet to account for reduced feed intake.

When cows are heat stressed, dry matter intake is decreased. Yea-Sacc® 1026 also maintains the following:

- Getting more nutrients out of forage helps to stimulate growth of fiber digesting bacteria in the rumen, increasing the rate and extent of forage breakdown.
- Boosting protein supply more rumen microbes mean more microbial protein available post-ruminally which promotes total protein supply to the animal for enhanced milk production.
