## Deworming Season

We've all seen the statistics of reduced performance caused by parasite infestations in our animals. This fall is the time to do something about it! For hogs, we have a feed topdress and water additive. We also have dewormers for sheep, goats, horses, wildlife, dogs and cats. If you prefer an injectable dewormer, please let us know and we will order it for you.

## **Grass Seed**

With the bulk of the summer heat and drought out of the way, it is a good time to start new grass seed in those bare or thin spots. Grass planted in the fall typically performs better next spring and summer because it had time to develop a better root system before winter. Keep in mind though, that moisture is essential to germination, so if we don't have any rain, watering will be necessary to success. We have a variety of available. including our mixes Keystone Lawn Mix, which was designed for this area. # Feeding Green Forages

We have reached the time of year where inventories of last year's forages may be getting low, but new crop hasn't had time to ferment yet. Here are some tips for feeding green forages to your herd:

- Remember to introduce green chop slowly by mixing it in with fermented feed for a few days.
- While feeding green chop, make sure plenty of free choice sodium bicarbonate is available to your animals. Offer several feeding stations to reduce competition from more aggressive animals.
- 3) Offer dry hay and/or increase long stem fiber sources in the TMR. These longer pieces force the cow to chew more, which helps buffer the rumen. The long stems also form a more effective rumen mat to help slow down the rate of passage.
- 4) Consider planting some FeedFirst corn varieties from Master's Choice, which are proven to be ready to feed sooner after harvest, which will be helpful next fall!

Dairy Recipe

With the excitement of entering a new school year, remember to consume 3 servings of dairy every day. It is as simple as enjoying a snack of milk, cheese and vogurt when you come home from school. #### GARDEN CASSEROLE

16 oz frozen broccoli cuts, thawed and drained 2 c. CHEDDAR CHEESE, shredded 1 medium onion, chopped 1 c. cooked chicken, chopped 1 red or green bell pepper, chopped 1/2 cup Bisquick

1 c. MILK 1/2 tsp. garlic salt 1 tsp. pepper 2 eggs

1/2 c. SOUR CREAM

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Coat a 9x13 casserole dish with Pam. Lay broccoli, 1 cup cheese, onion, chicken and bell pepper in the casserole dish. Set aside the extra 1 cup of cheese. Beat together remaining ingredients and pour over casserole. Bake uncovered for 38 minutes, then remove from oven, sprinkle the remaining I cup of cheese on the top and bake for another 3 to 5 minutes until cheese is melted. Let stand at least 5 minutes before serving.
